FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

What is LENT to you?

For those who grew up Catholic (or grew up with Catholics), Lent may be most noticeably about meatless Fridays. Many people associate Lent with penance, or the requirement to prostrate yourself before God and ask forgiveness, maybe feel a little more bad about yourself than in other seasons. Some folks think they should give up sweets for the season, but have no idea *why;* it's "what has always been done". None of those are very positive associations. "I ought to feel bad" is not a mantra for drawing closer to God.

Lent is a mysterious season when, Gertrud Mueller Nelson says, "the Church suggests that we engage our death and that we go about it as a community or as a family....Conscious engagement of suffering and death forces us to take stock of our gift of life and consider ways of reforming and living our lives more fully and passionately." When we are able to walk with Jesus toward the cross —and the empty tomb!—we are bound to come face to face with the misunderstandings, losses and failures, separations and loneliness, and fears that we know deep down in our lives. Suffering is a part of our life, a part that we tend to avoid at all costs. In Lent, we can enter into those griefs with Jesus beside us, not in order to suffer for suffering's sake but to find the hope of Christ in the midst of that which is most difficult and painful. Suffering is not just what we experience, but also what we have caused in the lives of others — an even more difficult issue to address, because it requires our repentance and our desire for changed lives.

We can affirm in this season that **God is with us** ("us": individually and communally) **and redeems what is lost, resurrects what is dying or dead in our lives, and restores us to relationship!** In our worship, in our prayer and reflection time, in our relationships with one another and with the world, Lent is like the labor that leads to birth: holy, wise, and productive, even through the pain.

Last year at our denomination's General Conference, an Act of Repentance & Healing Relationships with Indigenous Persons was held. This worship service was an invitation to a journey on the part of our churches and our denomination. Indigenous Methodists, including Native Americans, spoke of the systemic sins that have been committed against their people over many years, and the church was faced with these questions:

How do we repent, that is, make an "about face" or turnaround?

How do we identify our own racism in the church in order to give it a good funeral?

How shall we live differently in order to sincerely and authentically make a journey of faith with indigenous people? To become a genuine Body of Christ?

Some folks criticized the Act of Repentance because, they said, What difference does a fancy worship service do if there is no real response –study, action—by the people in the churches?

There is a study out now, which seems fitting for our engagement of the Lenten season. I hope you will join me for Walking the Trail of Repentance & Healing with Indigenous Persons on Thursdays (Feb. 14, 21, 28, Mar. 7, 14, 21) at 12:10 – 1:00 p.m. Please bring a brown-bag lunch with you and make your lunch hour a time of sharing, listening, repentance, and restoration. If your job doesn't allow you to be here on Thursdays, I will have notes for reflection and discussion and will try (!) to make the video segment for each session available on our website. As a church community that is located in the midst of a large Native American population, I think we have things to learn together... and be freed to be Christ's body in this place in a new way. I hope you will come!

BEMIDJI UNITED METHODIST CHURCH: MINUTES OF CHARGE CONFERENCE MEETING, JANUARY 13, 2013

Randy Burg, Church Council Chair/Lay Leader, called the meeting to order, reading the December 14, 2012 letter from Rev. Alan Bolte authorizing a special charge/church conference at BUMC.

Pastor Gay Albers led us in a short time of worship and celebration.

Sandra Kranz, Finance Chair, shared the proposed church Budget for 2013. Randy commended the Finance Committee for their time, expertise, and commitment on behalf of the church. Sandra shared the proposed budget (white sheet) and explained that, in spite of economic uncertainty, the people of our church paid **over** their pledged amount. She noted that we are paying our apportionments in full this year, which brought applause. Sandra pointed out small differences between our actual expenses this year ('12) and our projected expenses next year ('13). There were no questions from the floor.

Randy spoke to the issue of apportionments. Finance committee made a one-time, exceptional decision to withdraw \$6K from our church savings account to complete our apportionment payment for this year, feeling that our financial support to our larger church body is critical to our ministry at BUMC. The discussion leading to that decision was long and thoughtful, and the decision was not unanimous. The committee felt — overall — that we don't want the investment of our faith to be confined within the four walls of this church. Randy respectfully thanked John Robinson for continuing to urge us —as a congregation, and as Finance Committee — to pay our apportionments. Stewardship and Apportionment education with the congregation in this next year is imperative, so that we can continue to meet our apportionment commitment *through our pledged budget*.

Judy Comstock reported on the work of SPRC, including staff compensation. The pastoral compensation package for Pastor Gay was already voted on (brief congregational meeting in November, before our cluster charge conference in Park Rapids). We saved some money on staff salaries after Kathy Douglas resigned and before Krista Coyle was hired as Ministries Coordinator; Krista was also brought in at a slightly lower salary as a new staff member. Charity Yoder Smith, secretary, has received a small raise; SPRC felt it was important to concretely acknowledge Charity's many gifts and contributions and her value as an employee. Perry Schack, our custodian, has been an asset in maintaining the building. Randy thanked SPRC for their work.

John Robinson, Financial Secretary with Sandra Robinson, addressed Stewardship & Pledges (white sheet). John spoke of the generosity of the congregation. He also said we need to grow, numerically, in order to continue to support the budget. He reminded us to be welcoming to newcomers.

Since there were no further questions, Lorne Lofberg moved that we accept the budget as proposed. Jean Slinkman seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Pastor Gay presented the report of inactive/unresponsive members (green sheet), describing briefly what "inactive and unresponsive" means and how our church is in contact with those persons. No additional comments or revisions. Tom Gray moved that we approve the report. Diane Morris seconded. The motion passed.

Pastor Gay gave the nominations/lay leadership report (yellow) in Karren Clark's absence. *Corrections were made*: Nancy Holles is no longer the funeral coordinator, and Verna Lofberg is taking up that position (p. 4). De Pickett noted that two organizations –Northwoods Caregivers and Habitat for Humanity – were not listed

under "Missions/Church and Society". We added those; De volunteered to be the contact/coordinating person for both agencies. Becky Lueben's name should not appear under "homebound visitation".

We removed the names of Kristen McRae, Marcia Roline, and Becky Lueben from YAEC and added John Robinson, Kari Knudson, and Jenny Frenzel. Verna Lofberg is the new BMW President. There remain numerous openings on our committees. Those present at the charge conference were urged to give prayerful consideration to persons who might fill those roles (and to contact a member of the Nominations/Lay Leadership committee or Pastor Gay with ideas). De Pickett moved that we accept the nominations/lay leadership report; Ruth Howe seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Lo Sorensen called attention to the 3-year time limit/rotation for church committee members: people being recruited for church leadership positions need to know that they are agreeing to a limited time of service. All our church committees need—ideally—to operate by a 3-year rotation cycle for leadership. Lo asked if there was a UM policy about non-members chairing church committees. The Book of Discipline states that only members of Trustees are required to be professing members, as they function as official "chairpersons of the corporation". There was discussion of the history of capable and dedicated "non-members" who have chaired committees in this church. Kim Smith suggested that we need more frequent New Member classes if we are to integrate in/educate new members about opportunities to serve.

Kurt Kastella reported for the Trustees Committee. Kurt acknowledged Sandy Sterr and others for their tremendous work in cleaning the church this fall. He discussed roof leaks that have plagued the church through the year. BUMC did have roofing replaced/repaired in the past year. Recently, Trustees found the source of the leak in the Narthex: the church bell tower (which will be addressed in the spring). [We also had the stained-glass windows taken out and re-framed this summer.] Upcoming needs/expenses are: elevator maintenance, choir seating, and lighting issues in the sanctuary. The Organ Committee is moving ahead with fundraising and plans for renovation of the organ; Terry Bradley, a member of Trustees, is chairing that committee. Randy thanked the Trustees for their work.

Krista Coyle talked about the Youth program. She is using Youth Ministry Architecture to give more structure and planning to the youth program. The youth have been serving meals at the People's Church monthly as a mission/outreach activity. She also has the goal of reintegrating youth back into the larger ministry of the church.

Pastor Gay expressed gratitude for the depth of spiritual content of our youth programming under Krista's leadership, as well as for the excellence of our whole church staff. She spoke briefly about the upcoming Visioning Process for our church, which will help us move into a faithful future with more clarity about our ministry here. Pastor Gay dismissed us with a blessing.

Compassion Cradles Grief-Stricken Newtown

January 8, 2013—From Newtown United Methodist Church, Mary Hughes Gaudreau could see a makeshift memorial; the small two-lane road that leads through the Sandy Hook village was congested with people coming and going.

"What struck me about the community was that they were on a pilgrimage," said Gaudreau, a US Disaster Response consultant for UMCOR, who traveled to Connecticut for four days just before Christmas to help guide the church's immediate and long-term spiritual and emotional care. The church has been a center of spiritual solace—and a magnet for national media—in the wake of the shooting deaths of 28 people, including 20 children from the nearby Sandy Hook Elementary School. "People really wanted to do something. That desire to act was coupled with a powerful sense of reverence," she said. "People were very quiet, and people of all ages were extremely polite. Some people were handing out flowers to anyone who happened to be walking by."

The church—and in essence the entire community—became a place where people drew together to collectively, often silently, say: this violence is not who we are as human beings. "This was a very raw situation," said Gaudreau, "and what the church offered was a strong sense of people who want to believe better about humanity." People across the nation—and even worldwide—want to reach out, and it's challenging to try to channel their desire to do something, said Gaudreau. Plans are still underway for future outlets for wider memorial contributions as Newtown UMC continues to serve its local community.

UMCOR's support for Newtown UMC is an assurance to the local community that the larger church is with them during a profoundly painful time, said Gaudreau, who continues to help guide the church's clergy and laity about the trajectory of trauma recovery. "We do know that there will be long-term impacts from what happened." Gaudreau said the strong leadership within the church, including Senior Pastor Mel Kawakami, Associate Pastor Jane Sibley, and Deacon Sue Klein, will help shape a vision for future healing. "The pastoral and lay leadership of Newtown UMC is providing outstanding, compassionate, and insightful leadership through one of the most challenging times in their church's history," she said.

Many in Newtown UMC and the entire Sandy Hook community hope that in the coming weeks their hometown will become a national symbol of hope, and not one of violence. "Amid the reality of suffering, there is this profound belief that suffering will not have the last word," said Gaudreau. "It won't. I believe that."

As a church we received a thank you from Northwoods Caregivers for being a Member Congregation. What does this mean? First of all I am the contact for our church following in the footsteps of Elaine Hazard who was one of the first supporters of the program. We have been a Member Congregation since 1999. Our contributions support mileage costs for volunteers serving in this area.

Some accomplishments for 2012 for Northwoods Caregivers:

Provided over 30,500 (recorded) hours of direct care giving

Added 108 new care-receivers and 26 new volunteers

Continued supervised visitation and safe exchanges for 88 visits and 154 exchanges

Provided over 5,000 hours of respite care

Provided almost 4000 other volunteer services (shopping, paperwork assistance and companionship Held training sessions and educational workshops

Spearheaded Senior Community Clean Up Day with 300 volunteers serving 80 homes

And other activities including more than <u>100,000 miles for volunteers and providers and impacted</u> 5,538 individual community member's lives!

Our church has contributed over \$1,854 to Northwoods Caregivers this year plus volunteer hours. In 2011, over \$10,000 was paid out in mileage reimbursement to volunteers for the 20,000 miles of transportation services they provided in their own vehicles. This reflects only the 35% of volunteers that need to claim reimbursement. The majority of volunteers gave this service as a gift. Without your support this service would not be able to be provided.
