FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Hospitality, or "outreach", is more than a committee. It is a function of who we are as God's people! When we show hospitality, it is about showing God's love to everyone, extending love in the manner of Jesus to all who walk through our doors. Bishop Robert Schnase (from *Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations*, Abingdon Press, 2007) says this:

"Christian hospitality refers to the active desire to invite, welcome, receive, and care for those who are strangers so that they find a spiritual home and discover for themselves the unending richness of life in Christ. It describes a genuine love for others who are not yet a part of the faith community; an outward focus, a reaching out to those not yet known, a love that motivates church members to openness and adaptability, willingness to change behaviors in order to accommodate the needs and receive the talents of newcomers.

"Beyond intention, hospitality practices the gracious love of Christ, respects the dignity of others, and expresses God's invitation to others, not our own. Radical [hospitality] means drastically different from the ordinary practice, outside the normal, and so it provokes practices that exceed expectations, that go the second mile, that take welcoming the stranger to the max. It means people offering the absolute utmost of themselves, their creativity, their abilities, and their energy to offer the gracious invitation and reception of Christ to others."

That word – "radical"—can sound daunting, unless we remember God's radical love for us. Actually, offering God's invitation to others can start in some very simple ways:

Seeing your pew as your mission field, so that you are aware of who's there and who's not. Which of your neighbors is missing? It means noticing the new person (or someone sitting alone) and committing yourself to welcome them beyond a simple "hello". Who are they? What brought them here? What are they seeking in a faith community?

Giving your worship bulletin to someone during the week instead of tossing it into the recycling bin. The scripture and prayers might be helpful to someone else on his or her journey!

Understanding that the task of sharing the Christian faith isn't just the job of the pastor or Outreach Committee. Everything that goes on in our church and with our church's name on it should be about sharing the love of God with others and growing in the love of God ourselves! As a baptized part of the church, ministry is your calling and your gift. Share who you are and what you are grateful for. Most of all, don't be afraid – ask, and God will give you guidance and courage.

We are God's people, blessed to be a blessing!



Dear members and friends of Minnesota United Methodist Churches:

May God's grace and peace be multiplied to you.

Several years ago, a cabinet colleague gave me a T-shirt with the following saying printed on the front: "We've never done it that way before." I have heard this phrase referred to as the seven last words of the Church. On the back of my new T-shirt were the first seven words of the Church: "Ponder anew what the Almighty can do."

I believe in miracles because, like many of you, I have witnessed what God's grace, so abundantly, so freely, so extravagantly given, can do. I am an optimist, not by nature, but by faith and experience. I live and give out of a theology of abundance because I know that, in Christ, all things are possible.

God is working through Minnesota United Methodists to perform life-saving, life-transforming miracles. We have saved the lives of hundreds of thousands of children through our successful imagine No Malaria campaign (more than \$2.3 million raised to date). We improved the lives of tens of hundreds through last year's successful Cleaning Bucket Challenge (resulting in 719 full buckets, 136 empty buckets, and \$57,977). Our annual Love Offering for Missions has touched and healed countless lives.

Now, God is calling us to another miracle offering. God is calling us to "ponder anew what the Almighty can do." God is calling us to continue to save the children—the most vulnerable of God's beloved community.

Our 2014 Love Offering for Missions will have two components—a cash offering with a goal of at least \$120,000 and a feed-the-hungry component with a goal of 1 million meals.

This God-sized dream is in keeping with our 7014 annual conference theme: Unleashing Fearless, Spirit-Led Churches. Jesus commanded us to feed the hungry and provide the thirsty something to drink. Imagine 350-plus fearless, Spirit-led United Methodist congregations combining efforts in response to Jesus' kingdom imperative to heal a broken world.

Million Meals Marathon/Feed My Starving Children. This portion of our Love Offering will be gathered over the next few months, with the culmination of packing our millionth meal at the 2014 annual conference session, May 28-30. We are partnering with Feed My Starving Children.

to conduct meal-packing events in three permanent and three mobile locations across the conference and at the site of the annual conference session in St. Cloud. We are partnering with Feed My Starving Children because it is an Advance Special of The United Methodist Church and because it has developed a reliable infrastructure and process for delivering life-saving meals to people who need them most all over the world. When natural disasters strike, when drought devastates a fragile landscape, when war disrupts and displaces populations, Feed My Starving Children helps sustain lives. Meals have been distributed—mostly to children and their families—in nearly 70 countries through missionary partnerships at orphanages, schools, clinics, refugee camps, and malnourishment centers. Eighty percent of our cash Love Offering gifts will be used to help pay for the 1 million meals we will be packaging.

Project AgGrad. Ten percent of our cash Love Offering gifts will be distributed to Project AgGrad. This unique project, begun in 1986, provides scholarship assistance to graduate students from developing countries to study agriculture at the University of Minnesota. Each student agrees to return to his or her home country to become a leader in implementing sustainable agricultural practices designed to increase food production. This is one more way that Minnesota United Methodists feed the starving children of the world.

Volunteers in Mission scholarships. Ten percent of the cash Love Offering will provide scholarship assistance for first-time Volunteers in Mission. Most of the Volunteers in Mission teams from Minnesota are engaged in hands-on projects that build the infrastructure to ensure that our nutritional, medical, and educational programs in developing countries become sustainable and locally run. We are committed to increasing the number of first time volunteers who can travel and work in places where we are providing life-saving and life-transforming programs for the world's children.

Jurge you to let God's unlimited imagination take hold of you and your church as we "ponder anew what the Almighty can do" through Minnesota United Methodism. God is always seeking a faithful and fruitful people through whom God's miraculous grace can be made incarnate. May God unleash us as fearless, Spirit-led churches to multiply our loaves and fish to provide 1 million meals to the hungry children—God's children. Thank you for your sacrificial and extravagant generosity.






"We are taught that we originated from the Earth and that the Earth is the Great Mother of all. She provides us with everything we need to survive in this life." —Elder Larry Stillday
