November is upon us. It's a season for celebrating harvest and a season for giving thanks. God has blessed me and blessed us with much to be thankful for. This year, I am especially thankful for this church family and for the many years of faithfulness which are bearing fruit for the harvest of our desire to live abundantly with God and neighbors.

When this congregation was invited to begin the Healthy Church Initiative (HCI) process of renewal by our bishop, I had anxiety about the likely financial implications. Most HCI churches were being asked to vote on making building renovations. If this happened for us, how were we going to pay for it? As a lay person in the church I had been a member of, I experienced a capitol campaign for building and ministry enhancements as a place of division and anxiety. It took several years for that church to recover emotionally.

How would this work for our church? Upon my arrival, I hoped to lead us into a place of confidence about what God was doing with the church. It seemed as if the confidence of the church leadership had been shaken in recent years, and so I was focused on rebuilding the confidence the church had in itself. We have great people in our church family. It's our greatest asset. The invitation to church renewal involved risk. Were we up for it? These were questions I was bringing to God in my thoughts and prayers.

As a church family, you overwhelmingly voted to support the plan for renewing our church. The plan included improving and renewing our sanctuary. How were we going to pay for it?

We received a bequest for \$40,000 from a former member of our church. This was a complete surprise. We also had a significant financial asset from selling the parsonage many years ago. Thanks to the work of Mike Albrecht and the trustees, we were able to pay for renewing our sanctuary using these funds without a capitol campaign. Phew, what a sigh of relief!

Since that time we have had a constant stream of people participating in our worship services for the first time. Some of these folks have been people who are new to Bemidji, but many have been part of our neighborhood for a long time.

Yet we have also experienced the deaths of many long-time members of the church who have supported the church through their prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. We have many older members of the congregation that also make up a substantial part of the financial support of the church. Again, I've been turning to God with my thoughts and prayers and asking, "How are we going to pay for it?"

Day by day, week by week, season by season I see your church family making a difference in people's lives. Together we communicate God's grace and love to a world in need. While I feel some anxiety about our future, I'm also prepared to be surprised by God. Isn't that at the heart of gratitude and thanksgiving in the first place? Here we are, traveling on the third rock from a star which just happens to have conditions for life as we experience it to be possible. Perhaps we take it for granted. Maybe we could be more surprised.

May God grant us all joyful surprises and grateful hearts,
