Dear Church Family,

The months have wound down for what I am hoping will be our only COVID-19 summer. I have no way of knowing. We've had a relatively mild spike in cases in Beltrami County, and we are not over it yet. We will continue to have limited use of the church building for the foreseeable future.

In taking photos for the church directory, I have had a bunch of conversations. As a church family, we seem to be holding up well. But there are so many ways this has been an uncomfortable ordeal. Simple things like going out in public involve a lot more consideration. Mostly people are not feeling isolated, but they feel challenged not to be isolated.

It's been difficult for me as your pastor. Not being able to visit folks in the care centers for worship has me feeling saddened for people there. We've had deaths where I have not been able to be at bedside, or spend much time with families at the time when they are experiencing loss. I've shed more tears over my inability to be present than I have over the actual deaths. It's not an easy time to be elderly and vulnerable, especially in communal settings.

At the same time, I have a growing sense of how much people are becoming aware of their need for God in this great time of uncertainty. When so much seems outside of our control, we draw comfort that God is especially present with us whenever our lives are filled with uncertainty. The certainty of God's love is what we depend on, and the challenging time we are living in creates an opportunity to experience God's love.

In the midst of the sacrifices we have been making, it is also true that new people are receiving the Gospel. More people are experiencing grace and love through our congregation. More people are able to name and claim their identities as beloved children of God. Perhaps God is using the uncertainty of our present circumstances to grow the love we share with each other. Perhaps the love we experience with God will participate in healing our broken world. This is what I pray.

I know you are making sacrifices, as am I. Know that you are being of good faith as the Spirit moves within us, leading towards flowering of God's grace and love.



PREFACE

I began writing my memoirs during the summer of 2019, shorthy after my 70th high school class reunion, which I co-hasted. When I began writing we had never heard of Gorid-19, Hydroxychloroquine, Wuhan, China, and terms such as "Liberate Minnesota, Michigan and West Virginia". Our lives have changed in many ways during the past year. Having been "sheltered in place" for the past several months has given memore time to reflect on some of the challenges that my parents must have lived through during both Warld War I, the depression, Warld War II, rationing, and reising eight klds.

Our family was quarantined during the 1930's when my Dad developed scarlet fever followed by myself and others in the family. A red sign was placed near our front doer indicating that no one was allowed to come into our home, nor could we leave. Dr. Blomberg attempted to treat my Dad with suitid ardugs, not knowing that he would be very allergic to them. When Dad wasn't getting better, the Dr. prescribed a second dose which almost killed him. He always thought that the hernia that he developed after scarlet fever was caused by coughing so hard. In my lifetime I have seen many new drugs developed, such as penicillin, and others that now protect.

I have also during my 89 years seen many new developments in technology with products such as television, colored television, cell phones, aircraft that could break the sound barrier, astronauts that could fly to the moon, and even something as simple to us now as a ball point pen. I vividly remember doing a report in school and using a pen that we dipped into an ink well. If what you were writing blotted, you had to do the whole report over again.

Thanks must go to Velma, who has willingly typed and sometimes retyped several scripts of these memories. Thanks to others in the family who I have contacted for additional information and verification. Thanks also go to all of our family and friends who have made an impact on my life and have been an important part in various and interesting ways.

Hopefully, sometime in the future, we will be able to have the "coffee cart" set up in the lounge, as before.

We currently have in stock most of our coffee in both ground/ whole bean, and chocolate minis, and a limited supply of chocolate bars, olive oil.
