Dear Church Family,

Many businesses and organizations in our community are beginning to meet without masking and physical distancing. While the vaccination rate has plateaued, the infection, hospitalization, and death rates continue to drop. Many if not most in our church family have been vaccinated. You will be hearing more from the church after our council meeting.

It has been uplifting and hopeful to be celebrating in-person worship in our sanctuary again. As much as one can worship God in any space, the sanctuary has been a holy place for many people over many years. I am especially grateful for the work of Deborah and volunteers for making the worship services feel safe. As a church family, we've been taking careful steps to protect vulnerable members of our congregation. If you have been participating in this effort, God bless you!

If we are, indeed, coming to the time when the pandemic recedes, we will face new questions.: How have we grown, how have we learned, and where have we experienced God's presence during our time of isolation? Have we discovered life patterns to leave behind or new patterns to carry forward in the future? What of our experience this year would be helpful and hopeful to share in our community?

I have learned to value our online worshiping community. In-person church has not been a good fit for many people prior to the pandemic, and we are finally beginning to broadening our outreach to include them. While the connections we make with each other are different than in-person, they are a vitally important means for people to experience God's presence in their lives. We intend to continue this ministry for the foreseeable future.

Michelle and I continue to hone and reshape online worship. We strive to make it especially hospitable towards people with little church experience, while at the same time introducing and re-introducing worship and liturgy as a means of grace in our lives.

As we begin to move into summer and also greater possibilities of outdoor gatherings, it's also a time of relaxation and gratitude for life and love. May this season in your life be blessed by God's love. Having been blessed, may you continue to share love in our community and world.

> **Re-Gathering Plan for Churches Current Phase: Blue**

We are now in the BLUE PHASE

Churches can open with no capacity limits but social distancing is still highly encouraged and masks are recommended for anyone unvaccinated. We would offer these considerations as you determine your requirements in this new phase:

Remember the essential risk factors of COVID: indoors. proximity, and length of time. A good rule of thumb to keep people safe is to meet two of these three conditions when meeting in a public space, especially when you don't know the vaccination status of participants: outdoors, social distanced, masked.

You might want to encourage those with colds to wear a mask when they come to church to protect others. Continue to have masks and hand sanitizer available as an act of hospitality.

Keep offering people different worship options as we are all emerging from COVID in different phases: outdoor, indoor, online. Make use of all modalities to allow for the fullest participation.

Congregational singing is still considered a high-risk activity. Consider doing congregational singing outdoors, having people masked if there's congregational singing indoors, or having only members of your worship band sing while others hum along.

Be cautious about how you re-introduce coffee fellowship time and potlucks. Eating and mingling indoors creates higher-risk conditions.

Continue to use no-touch alternatives for the passing of the peace and greeting each other (including the pastor at the end of the service).

Serve communion in individual cups and pre-cut the bread.

Our Love Offering this year is dedicated to feeding the hungry and ministering to migrants. The funds from this year's offering will to go to: The Methodist Border Friendship Commission (50 percent), host churches of Ruby's Pantry (20 percent), the Matthew 25 food distribution (20 percent), and Volunteers in Mission scholarships (10 percent).

As you may know, Ruby's Pantry comes in to the Bemidji Community. The Pantry gathers various food overages, surpluses, and bumper crops into generous food bundles for a low \$20 contribution. There is no income eligibility to attend. All are welcome! Bemidji's host is Mount Zion Church in Nymore. They also participate in Community Table with Bemidji United Methodist. Mount Zion serves lunches on Monday and Tuesday. United Methodist Bemidji serves dinners on Wednesday and Thursdays from 4:30-6:00.

The Annual Conference Session will be streamed to the Minnesota Conference Facebook page, and visitors will be able to watch at no cost. A Facebook account is not necessary to access the live stream.

2020: A Year for the Books

Bemidji Community Food Shelf staff and volunteers are proud to have served our community through this remarkable year. Here are some highlights of our 2020 journey:

When the pandemic was declared in March we lost about 70% of our regular volunteers due to health concerns.

Parking lot distribution started March 23, staffed by volunteers from area businesses and some of our regulars. United Way provided a staff to cover for a quarantining employee.

We implemented limited delivery services to home bound customers.

A new roof was installed and at \$79,000, was the largest single expense in our history aside from our building purchase.

A new truck was purchased with a COVID Transportation Grant.

Our office space was updated thanks in part to a donation of carpet tiles from Kraus-Anderson Construction and with help from volunteers Nancy and Mike Mason and Gerry Cardinal.

A new, larger walk-in freezer was installed, funded by a gift from the Howe Thiel Charitable Fund, a COVID grant, Affinity Plus Federal Credit Union, and MDU Resources. The Farm at the Food Shelf harvested a record 15,000 pounds of produce for our customers.

We partnered with Community Resource Connections to deliver over 30,000 pounds of food to high-risk seniors in Blackduck.

We moved operations back inside the building in October, with a COVID-safe protocol.

We ended 2020 with a record 12,584 household visits, distributing a total of over 820,000 pounds of food and with senior visits up 30%.

DID YOU KNOW?

The need for food throughout the state and nation has risen dramatically since March 2020. With summer arriving and no relief in sight for many pandemic-affected families, making sure we have the capacity to help our community is ever on my mind.

Even in normal times, hunger is not a seasonal condition (most food shelves are busier in the summer), and support for food shelves tends to be much higher in winter months. During the Campaign, GMCC and its partners team up to offer a partial match, which spurs donations and helps us make it through the busy summer months.

This year, our goal is to collect 35,000 pounds of food and \$100,000 in donations.

I am encouraging families, businesses, fraternal organizations and clubs to get involved this year

through fun, COVID-safe activities and competitions.
