Dear Church Family,

Last week I had the opportunity to serve as conference preacher for Annual Conference. This is the yearly gathering of United Methodists in Minnesota. Each year, the name of a full elder in the conference is drawn from a hat to be conference preacher for the following year. My name was drawn last year.

If you haven't already experienced this worship service, you will have an opportunity to do so for one of our future online worship services. Much of the worship services of this year's conference will be available on the Minnesota Annual Conference website.

My sermon incorporates reflections on my years of serving people most often referred to as disabled. If you want to know more about why I chose these words in describing the people I served you can find out by watching the sermon

In the course of preparing for this worship service, I have been reflecting on why the Minnesota Conference of the United Methodist Church is so important to me. When I began my transition from nursing to parish ministry, I changed denominations. The church I was a member of was actually part of two denominations: Presbyterian and UCC. My reasons for changing were not theological. The church I was a member of was not far theologically from your church.

What I still find attractive about our denomination is its outward focus. We started as a movement to share the Gospel. Our missional focus is to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. Our strategy is to reach new people and participate in healing a broken world. While this is difficult to do in our era, it is still our commitment.

Compared to other expressions of Christianity, we place greater emphasis on reaching new people. Why might this be important for you, especially if you have been a member of the church for a long time? Well, perhaps my answer for why it is important to me is theological. In reaching and being in relationship with new people, I have experienced my experience of redemption and the fullness of God's love to be interwoven with the faith journey of other people. When I meet and relate to new people, I experience more of God. This has been transformative in my life, and I believe it is transformative of our shared lives.

This is the start of my seventh year as your pastor. I believe the next six months will be a pivotal time for making disciples. Our world is in need and the pandemic has opened many people to our need for God and each other. I am praying we will be able to keep our hearts laser focused on being the church we set out to be with the Healthy Church Initiative. I ask you to pray for existing participants in the life of our congregation and pray for people whom we have not yet met. May our doing so open our hearts, minds, and doors to God's grace.

Bemidji Artist Makes It Big on TikTok

Jex Nwalor almost certainly has more TikTok followers than you. In fact, he has more followers than the population of the state of Kansas, the city of Rome or the country of Albania — a whopping 2.9 million. This sudden fame and attention stemmed from a love of music for the freshman business management major and basketball player at Oak Hills Christian College.

Born and raised in Brampton, Ont., Canada, just outside of Toronto, Nwalor moved to the United States to attend high school in Gilbert, Ariz. A few years later, he ended up in the area after coming to Bemidji to play basketball for Oak Hills Christian College.

Nwalor has been surrounded by music his whole life but said he never took it very seriously, just singing casually in informal choirs or at church.

"A lot of my friends back in Canada didn't even know I could sing. Because I didn't even know I could sing either," he said.

Why the ukulele? Nwalor also plays the piano and the guitar, but said he likes that the ukulele sounds like an "at home" kind of instrument.

A few years ago, all of his cousins got ukuleles for Christmas. That's when it clicked. Along with the fame came opportunities to capitalize on it.

As the ukulele is a relatively niche instrument, Nwalor has received a lot of attention from major ukulele manufacturers. Right now, he is partnering with Uku Ukuleles to sell his own ukulele, which is called "The Jex" and is available for preorder.

Currently, he is stepping back from his education and basketball career to focus more on music and marketing himself. Within the next five years, Nwalor hopes to have released many original songs and moved back to the West Coast.

Nwalor is new to the songwriting aspect of music, but thanks to his internet success, has a contact at a major record label who has helped connect him with R&B songwriters and lyricists when he hits a writing block. He hopes to inspire others to discover their own hidden talents as he did. "There are a lot of people out there that have hidden talents they don't know about, and that they should keep exploring," he said. "You should show your talents for sure, just express yourself. Don't let anybody tell you anything different. Be yourself."

For Nwalor, family remains his biggest inspiration. "I'm trying to do this for my mom. She gave her best for me and my two other brothers," Nwalor said. "My dad passed away in September 2010, and she's been super strong, raising the three of us on her own. I just want to give back to her, for what she's done for us."

Shirley Simmerman, 93, of Bemidji, MN died Wednesday, June 23, 2021, in her home surrounded by her loving family.

Private family services will be held later.

Shirley Jean Allen was born November 17, 1927, to Leonard and Nellie Allen of Northome, MN where she was raised and graduated from Northome High School in 1945. She graduated from Rogers & Benner Beauty School in Minneapolis in 1946. After graduation she worked at the Looking Glass Beauty Salon and O'Meara's. After her apprenticeship, Shirley received her manager's license. She returned to Minneapolis and worked for N.W. National Bank at its main office in the transit department. Shirley then moved back to Northome and worked at 1st State Bank of Northome for 6 years as bookkeeper and teller. She served two terms as village treasurer of Northome. She married Vernon Simmerman on February 12, 1953, in Bovey, MN. They lived in Northome for six years then moved to Bemidji in 1960, where Vernon worked for MnDOT. They began building their home in 1960 and Vernon died in 1967. They had four children at the time. Shirley completed the home building and educated the children in Bemidji- two graduating from Bemidji State University and the other two graduating from NTC Bemidji. After the children were educated, she went back to work as an AVON representative for eight years, worked for ISD 31 in the bakery and then went to work for Pan O' Gold Bakery Company in the Holsum Thrift in Bemidji for 26 plus years from which she retired at the age of 80. Shirley held membership in the American Legion Auxiliary for 60+ years, serving as president and in VFW Auxiliary, Order of the Eastern Star serving as Worthy Matron. She was also a member of the United Methodist Church in Bemidji. Shirley enjoyed knitting, for the troops, crocheting, tatting, arts, and crafts. She also loved playing piano.

She is survived by her daughters, Vickie Simmerman, Terri (Douglas) Simons and Hollie Simmerman; son, Michael (Jean) Simmerman; 5 grandchildren, Samantha & Luke Simmerman, Nicholas & Zachary Simons, and Morgan Simmerman; 2 great-grandchildren, Hailie & Payton Simmerman; sister, Ruth Jourdan; five nieces & nephews. She was preceded in death by her parents; husband, Vernon Simmerman; stepson, Larry Mills; mother & father-in-law; sister-in-law; 3 brothers-in-law; a niece.
