Dear Church Family,

I hope you had a wonderful and blessed Easter. I am looking forward to being with you at the end of my medical leave on May 2, 2022. While my heart arrhythmia has still not resolved, it is being managed. Thank you for your prayers, support, and encouragement over the last few months.

I've had time to reflect on my years of serving as your pastor. It's been a great joy to share life, sing, and worship together. I am thankful for the people who are great leaders of your church, and especially grateful for their leadership through the Healthy Church Initiative. I am proud to have been your pastor.

As Ordained Elders, Michelle and I made a commitment to serve in the Minnesota Conference wherever we are appointed. Pastors itinerate (move from church to church) in our denomination based on the missional needs of the congregations. This is familiar to people who have been in a United Methodist church for a significant amount of time, but may be unfamiliar to those who have not.

In my last letter I shared with you my intention to seek a change of appointment to another church. The Bishop and cabinet were able to meet that request, and Michelle and I will be moving to serve churches which are new to us. We are moving to Virginia, MN. Michelle will be serving Wesley (Hibbing) United Methodist Church while I will serve in Virginia.

Here's the official language announcing this change, with my affirmation: "Bishop David Bard intends to appoint The Reverend Rob Kopp to Peace United Methodist Church in Virginia, MN and I have affirmed this decision. The new appointment will begin July 1, 2022.

Our District Superintendent will use information from our church's profile and past consultations in order to assist the Bishop and Cabinet in making a new pastoral appointment. If necessary, District Superintendent Laurie Kantonen may consult further with our S/PPRC Chairperson or Committee members."

There is some heartache in making this change. I will miss you. I also believe you will find great opportunities to experience God's love through the pastor who will follow me. Your new pastor will assume all of the blessings and challenges of serving as your pastor. May your ministry together be blessed.
