Dearest Beloved Congregation,

Blessed Autumn to you! It's a season we all look forward to and sometimes worry about the season that follows. I will tell you that the response to the letter you've each received by email, US Post or in Worship Service (and added below) has been heartwarming. A single time visitor gave generously \$500 with a lovely letter which is included in this newsletter. I appreciate your thoughts, your actions, your belief, and hope. It IS what will get us to the other side of this mountain. Many of you asked for more detail about finances and that is provided below from those who are experts at the facts and figures. We are not alone in this walk. God is our Victory, always has been, always will be; God gives us the strength to do what we must, and the joy in which to do it. How amazing is God!

Pledged and non-pledged contributions have always fluctuated on a month-to-month basis. As we track our financial progress, we are not bringing in enough revenue to cover our monthly expenses and have little reserve funds available at this point. Here are the specifics in brief:

The average monthly deficit currently is over \$2,500, which translates to an annual deficit of over \$30,000 for 2022. Winter, with snow removal and increased heat, will likely increase that figure.

To meet this deficit, our pledging members would ALL need to increase our pledges by 30%. That's a lot to ask, and we fully realize that not everyone can! However, if we all do what we can, we can climb this mountain and immerge at the top, stronger, more unified, and even more able to answer God's call.

Knowing that some would like to know more details about our expenses, I have gone through and calculate the approximate monthly costs in 5 categories:

Staffing and all associated expenses	\$9,000
Utilities	\$2,250
Custodial	\$1,200
Snowplowing and sidewalk sweep	\$ 325
Photocopying	\$ 275

If any of you would like figures for other categories, feel free to ask. Please realize that these are approximate averages. I hand calculated them and cannot guarantee that everything got in the correct category (hey, humans make mistakes). Once our new Bookkeeper gets everything recorded, we will be able to get more precise, and more detailed figures.

We all know that if our income is less than our expenses, ultimately, we have to do one of 2 things: reduce our expenses or increase our income. Increasing our attendance will of course help increase the non-pledged income. We have seeing fluctuating but increased attendance, with people returning and new people coming. These past few weeks showed the highest attendance we have seen since before COVID. People's hunger for a stable community family will continue to bring them as long as we continue to remind them and invite them.

- ... And your church is working to reduce expenses:
- Trustees are unplugging refrigerators.
- They will be cutting the heat in the downstairs, Sunday School/Family Room area this winter.
- -T hey have considered the sale of some of our unused property.
- I am not submitting any expense vouchers for which the church is obligated to pay, but am paying them myself, which, so far since June, has been \$1500.
- Karen and I have been buying our own office and cleaning supplies. **BMW has graciously given \$1000.** for office supplies toward this since this letter.
- Finance is seeking grants, and we are hoping to again increase building use income. I have put ads across social media local groups offering our church as a venue for meetings, events, classrooms, etc.

As a short-term fix, Church Council/Finance has pulled \$30,000 from our Foundation General Account.

We have budgeted down the cleaning costs, shaved expenses off garbage pickup, personally inspected the building daily making sure nothing unnecessary is left on or running.

But, these are primarily short fixes. The long-term fix is to increase our income. This is where I come to you. This brave and beautiful church... YOU, each and every one of you beautiful souls, have seen a lot. Even recently! We're living through a pandemic with its declines and shortages; we've endured shutdowns and absence, strokes and hospital stays of pastors, remodeling, reimagining, re-emerging, exclusion, inclusion, political upheaval, and all that went with it. We've seen children running up the stairs to the balcony, watched baptisms in tears, then again heard their laughter, and caught ourselves on our own. Transition, transition, transitions!

We've comforted each other in tears and stood up with each other in hard times. Some of you have known and loved each other for decades. We've seen times of plenty and times of lack, and you've always seen each other through. I ask that you do it again. Your church family needs you today. If you are able to see your way to giving \$10 more a week, \$100 more a week... it will make a difference in the lives of those you've come to love over all these years together. And, it will continue to make a difference to those who you don't yet know.

You know how I'm always asking you to Imagine? Well, I'm asking again: imagine again the laughter of children, whether it's an after-school program, special music, or a Sunday school march. Imagine a choir, imagine gatherings of church family, celebrating birthdays, enjoying coffee and conversation, singing and creating, gathering to watch performances, dine together, worship together, learn and pray and laugh together.

We use this church home as a place to say hello, a place to ask, "how are you?" and a place to say goodbye.

Now imagine it gone.

Please give what you can. We can weather these last storms too, together.

I've been asked to tell you that our Finance Committee and Church Council will answer any questions you have in person, by phone and by appointment.

We are amazingly strong, when we all work together, when we all stand together.

Howe/Welle Golf Tournament August 26, 2022

The Howe/Welle Annual Golf Tournament was a success again this year at the Bemidji Town and Country Club. BUMC would like to thank member Ruth Howe, for all she continues to do in the community. This summer, the tournament raised approximately:

All proceeds from the golf tournament and silent auction will directly benefit BSU's nine women's athletic program.

A reboot of the long-running Lady Beaver golf tournament that supported women's athletics at BSU from 1983-2010, the Howe-Welle tournament is named in honor of two of the founders of the tournament – former BSU women's basketball (1964-76), tennis coach (1976-86) and pioneer of women's athletics at the university, Dr. Ruth Howe, and longtime BSU athletics supporter Jeanette Welle.

Then I remembered a truism, "The only love you really have is what you give." He is smart that way.

So is your pastor. I strongly believe that with her energy and everyone's help "we" can stop the downward momentum and get back in the black.

Based on that green letter, I feel sure that every penny given from here on in will be used wisely. The church is one of our best forums to give and receive. It's value goes far into the future, beyond our short lives. It truly deserves our energy and attentiveness.

I have always been cheap, especially with myself but I am trying to be more generous because life is short. In hopes of stimulating people to look at the value of what they are getting, here is is \$500 to help get the ball rolling a little.


Did you know BUMC has a Toastmasters Group that meets every other Tuesday night?
